### BELMONT MEMORIAL LIBRARY MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

BELMONT, MASSACHUSETTS September 18, 2012

Chair Lowrie called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m.

Present: Trustees Elaine Alligood, Mark Carthy, and Mary Keenan and Director Maureen Conners. Trustees Sarah Phillips and Matt Sullivan were absent.

The minutes of the June 5 meeting were unanimously approved; the motion was made by Chair Lowrie and seconded by Trustee Alligood.

#### **Old Business**

Field Meeting Update Chair Lowrie explained that the timing of the library project has changed; the earliest announcement of the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC) grant will be three months after the expected date, so approval at Belmont Town Meeting and the appointment of a building committee has been moved to the spring Town Meeting. Hence, time for fund raising is expanded. The question was raised - do we want a push for funds at the end of the year that is the usual gift-giving period? The MBLC grant will be announced in October with definite awards for the top eight applicants; Belmont is second on the list. Then, with six months needed for debt exclusion, this would happen at the fall 2013 Town Meeting. Belmont would need an extension from the MBLC for this.

Trustee Carthy suggested that there be separate fund raising to tie-in with library events so potential donors would have the library on their radar.

The question of a vote for the debt exclusion was considered: is the library the only item on the November ballot which is needed to meet state requirements? An extension would be needed from the state.

There is no new action on the field/pool front; the RFP is underway. Regarding the incinerator site, the state mandated that the Town remediate the site; this has not happened. There has not been a possibility of meeting with the state on the incinerator site. Chair Lowrie will contact Board of Selectmen Chair Paolillo.

Trustee Carthy asked if the debt exclusion requires a separate vote. Would a Town Meeting vote be sufficient for the library debt exclusion? Given the small amount of money for the library project, could the library slide in as other debt exclusions are met?

#### Belmont Library Foundation - Video update

The video needs a statement on the need for a library in the Internet Age. Director Conners will tell Ann Donahue, videographer, that the calendar has changed. The target date is now March.

#### Grants

The grants for the YA proposal and the Preservation of Materials were denied by the state.

#### Painting of Building

Director Conners has had difficulty in getting a bid for painting the library; Trustee Carthy suggested combining this job with another town job.

#### Wireless update

Director Conners reported that the new update is working; what had been spotty coverage is now excellent.

#### **New Business**

Judy McSwain of the Circulation staff has submitted her resignation effective September 27, but wishes to remain involved with filling-in and volunteering. Chair Lowrie made a motion to approve hiring to fill this position immediately. Seconded by Trustee Carthy, the motion passed unanimously.

#### One Book, One Belmont

Trustee Alligood introduced the Art Opening with works by Lee Strasburger, the "Anatomy of Melancholy." The September 15 concert by the Apocalypso Players led by Roger Brown was a success; author Tom Perotta joined the final set. Director of Adult Services Emily Reardon was commended for her excellent work in organizing the One Book, One Belmont program.

#### Director's Report

Concern was expressed that the Children's Circulation down: it was noted that it was August in Belmont with 21, 749 children's books circulated!

Mary Alice Wistman is the new president of the Friends of the Belmont Library (FOBL); Megan Pickett is vice-president. The FOBL has given \$500 to librarian Miriam MacNair's Books and Bites program which now includes speakers. Trustees are invited to volunteer to assist at the Friends Book sale, the weekend of October 12 to 14; contact Mary Alice Wistman.

David Kale, the new town administrator has visited the Belmont Library and met library staff; Director Conners will invite Mr. Kale to the next trustees meeting.

There was discussion and agreement that the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Library Trustees would be posted on the library web-site.

#### **Executive Session**

Chair Lowrie called for an Executive session with the reason to discuss union negotiations; all subjects that will be discussed cannot be discussed outside of Executive Session. The regular meeting will not reconvene; adjournment will follow Executive Session. The roll call vote to move into executive session is as follows:

Trustee Carthy – Yes, Trustee Keenan – Yes, Trustee Alligood – Yes, Chair Lowrie – Yes. The meeting moved into Executive Session.

#### Building and Grounds

The large limb of the first locust tree that had a huge split in it was removed.

I have been getting quotes to have the building painted. When I was doing the budget last year no painting company got back to me with a quote so I made a guess-timate \$8,000. This was simply scraping, then priming and covering with two coats of paint. No removing of the storm windows because the inside paint is fine-I was assuming that not having to remove and reattach 125 storms would certainly be a big savings. Well, the first estimate to paint the building was \$31,000. Then I asked for just the front of the building. Those came in at between \$14,000 and \$17,000. Then I asked what could I get done for \$8,000-\$9,000. We can do most of the front of the building which is the plan. I will work out a contract and have the Town attorney look at it. Hopefully we can have it done in the fall.

#### Director's Report

**Field/BLF** - This is from the August meeting. I know we all know about the RFP regarding the pool and field. The subcommittee that is working with BLF to produce a video met while I was on vacation. I did meet with Ann on Wednesday, Sept. 12 and answered some of her questions. I would like to spend some time discussing her plan at the meeting. If there is any new information on either of these topics, we can discuss them at the meeting.

**Grants** - The Construction Grants will be awarded to the top 8 libraries the first or second week in October.

I regret to inform you Ellen did not receive her YA grant and I did not receive the small preservation grant. (Remember Denise did receive the Family Adventures in Reading grant). However, I saw Liz Allison at Meet Belmont and she asked about the preservation grant. I told her we did not receive it so she said to send her a proposal for the digitization of the local newspapers. Mary and I had mentioned this to Liz during the budget meetings. I am waiting for the correct Reproduction Release form being sent from Gateway Media for the Belmont Citizen Herald and checking to see if I need to ask permission from someone else to reproduce the Belmont Herald. Hopefully I will receive permission in time for Liz's November deadline. Dana Willis, attorney from Matt's law firm, did a lot of the research on the costs for digitization last year.

**Wireless** - We have been working with the Town and the School to upgrade our wireless service in the building. The work has been completed and the service is excellent. The

new wireless network uses the same Comcast modem and router behind the Reference Desk. This has been configured to broadcast the wireless connection to repeaters throughout the building (called "Access Points"). We have the same source for the internet, but now it is broadcast throughout the building.

If you would like to try it out when you're here, the name of the wireless network is Belmont-Public-Library. You should look for that name on your device and choose it. It is unfiltered and is not password protected. You will have to click "Accept" in a browser to accept our Internet and Computer Use policy in order to connect.

Em made a FAQ sheet which is in your packet.

**Position Vacancy** - Judy McSwain is resigning from her permanent part-time position as of September 27. Judy has worked in the circulation department for the past six years. I would like this position vacancy to be filled as soon as possible.

**PROJECT Abstract:** With the funding from this grant, the Belmont YA department will be able to update the YA room (within an aging library building), reaching out to area tweens and teens to create a multi-use destination space that will serve their evolving recreational and educational needs with dynamic services, committed staff, and creative uses of technologies.

Supporting this transformation will be a rejuvenated Teen Advisory Board with a heavy emphasis on middle school recruitment and involvement, leading to tween/teen driven programming responding to, and anticipating the needs of Belmont youth, both recreational and academic.

Upon completion of this project, it will be obvious to all involved, from tweens & teens patrons, to parents, to staffers what a valuable community resource Belmont Library Young Adult Department can be.

#### REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION NOT TO FUND:

This program is not recommended for funding based on a lack of needs assessment or correlation to the library's long range plan. The proposal is library-focused as opposed to demonstrating the needs of the community and the target group. Much is already offered to this age-group and the committee did not see innovation in the proposed programming, though they did appreciate the project's outreach to homeschool students. The technology needs of teens are not addressed in the proposal and are neglected in the collection development which focuses mainly on adding DVDs and games.



### Where in the library does the wireless access work?

Everywhere! You can connect throughout the building including in the Children's Room and Assembly Room on the lower level, in the East and West Wings on the main level, and on the Balcony.

#### Can I print wirelessly?

Printing is not currently available through our wireless network.

#### Can I print from a library computer?

Yes, you may print from library PCs for 10 cents a page in black and white, or 25 cents for color. Use your email or a flash drive to transfer a document from your wireless device to a library computer.

### What equipment do I need to use the wireless Internet?

A laptop equipped with a wireless network interface card (802.11b or later), or a mobile device that is Wi-Fi compatible.

#### Why can't I connect?

After selecting Belmont-Public-Library, you will need to launch a browser such as Firefox, Internet Explorer or Safari. When you see the library's *Internet/Computer Acceptable Use Policy* click the "Accept" button.
