
<u>Dream Team</u> by Jack McCallum-In 1992 the IOC opened the door to professional basketball players in the Olympics and the U.S. responded by putting together the greatest collection of talent ever seen on one team. Using his own notes from covering the team that year and interviews with the players nearly twenty years later McCallum tells the story of the Dream Team including bonding over card games in hotels, the politics behind the controversial decision to leave Isaiah Thomas off the team, and a play-by-play account of the most famous pickup game in history. **BELMONT/Adult 796.323 MCC**










<u>The Camel Club</u> by David Baldacci-A quartet of Washington D.C. conspiracy theorists, whose leader goes by the pseudonym Oliver Stone, witness the murder of a Secret Service agent set up to look like a suicide. While the Secret Service investigates, the four men start their own investigation discovering that some of their theories might not have been as far fetched as the general public might think. <u>A conspiracy of faith</u> by Jussi Adler-Olsen-Detective Mørck used to be one of Copenhagen's top homicide detectives but now he runs Department Q where he and his team work the city's cold cases. This time a letter in a bottle written in blood leads the team towards a kidnapping case that was never reported and whose perpetrator may still be at large. <u>Gateway to freedom</u> by Eric Foner-Sydney Howard Gay, the New York abolitionist and newspaperman, was one of the few involved with the Underground Railroad to keep detailed records of his activities. With Gay's notes and other primary sources Foner has put together a history of the Underground Railroad in New York, a state where abolitionists weren't always in the majority leading up to the Civil War. The historian goes beyond the legends of the Underground Railroad to give readers an idea of what it was life was like for escapees and those helping them. **BELMONT/Adult 973.71 FON**

Sisters: the lives of America's suffragists by Jean Baker-Over 130 years passed between when the U.S. Constitution was signed and when a federal amendment was passed giving American women the right to vote. Lucy Stone, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Frances Willard, and Alice Paul were all instrumental in the fight for women's suffrage in the United States. Baker delves into everything from upbringings to romantic relationships to explore how each woman's personal life motivated her in the fight for women's rights. **BELMONT/Adult 324.623 BAK**
