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THE TIME IS NOW



It's time to build a new home for the Belmont Public Library.

In 1902, Charles Underwood made a gift to his community that continues to change lives – Belmont's first library building. Dedicated to his parents and gifted to the town, the library was an affirmation of family, community, and the power of learning.

In 1965, Belmont residents carried that inspiration forward and built the current library, which has served the town for almost 60 years of tremendous growth in library services. Today, the Belmont Public Library is one of the most utilized in the state with circulation numbers reaching the 10th highest only behind much larger communities. Belmont residents rely heavily on our free public library for essential services and opportunities to connect with the community.

Now, in 2022, it's time to reinvest in the Belmont Public Library. Behind the hub of activity at the library is a failing building whose infrastructure is far beyond repair. To keep this invaluable town resource thriving, the building must be replaced. Support for the Library Building Project is growing, and we are closer than ever to making a new building a reality. More than 600 donations have been made to support the library's future, bringing our fundraising total to more than \$2 million. There is strong momentum for this vital project.


The time is now. Our library needs a new home, and we need your help to make it happen. Together, we can continue our town's legacy of a free public library for our families, our neighbors, and our community.



To keep a library in Belmont, our library needs a new home.**




OUTDATED ELECTRICAL SYSTEM IS AT END OF LIFE AND NEEDS TO BE REPLACED

BRITTLE PIPES CRACK, AND ANTIQUATED SYSTEMS ARE DIFFICULT TO REPAIR



“There’s always something going on at the library – author talks, movie nights, knitting circles, tai chi. Honestly, it’s one of the busiest places in town.”

“At the old library, I couldn’t even come in the front door, and my wheelchair didn’t fit in the elevator from the basement. Our new library is 100% accessible. It’s a game changer.”

the new library

- Two-story, approximately 42,000 square foot building on the current library site
- Ground level entrance to fully ADA-compliant building
- Building complements and extends the revitalization of Concord Avenue
- Highly sustainable building with all electric systems
- Parking area consolidated to one side of the library (same number of spaces)
- Exterior Veterans Memorial

VIEW OF LIBRARY FROM CONCORD AVENUE

The new library fronts Concord Avenue with the consolidated parking on the west side of the building and a new green space behind the library building.





I come every afternoon to read the newspaper in my favorite comfy chair in the Commons. It's my thing.

We rolled the shelves to the side and hosted a community fair on the entire first floor. We had at least 1,000 people come through.

the new library

- Bright, open, and welcoming Library Commons
- Multiple seating options with small round tables and lounge chairs
- Flexible gathering space with movable bookshelves and stadium seating on stairs
- Lobby shared by all building entrances with sight lines that add to safety and security
- Circulation desk with independently accessed material holds and self-checkout
- Dedicated Friends of the Library space and book sale room

Everyone enters into the centralized light-filled lobby, a hub of browsing with a variety of seating types and views to different parts of the library.



The sound is amazing. My string quartet played a concert, and we had a real connection with the audience.

AN APPEALING DESTINATION FOR MEETINGS, SPEAKERS, AND PERFORMANCES

I'm president of a local non-profit and we operate on a shoestring budget. The library's meeting rooms are an incredible resource for groups like ours.



My kids love the shows – magic, music, puppets. In the old library, the room could be too full, and kids were turned away. Now everyone fits.




the new library

- Large, flexible community room with space for 150 seats for large meetings, workshops, performances, gallery exhibits, author talks, and more
- Attractive room with acoustical enhancements
- After-hours access when the rest of the library is closed

VIEW OF THE LARGE COMMUNITY ROOM

Located directly next to the lobby, the ground floor program room can be accessed after hours (when the library is closed) to serve an even greater range of community functions.

A BIGGER CHILDREN'S WING THAT EMBRACES BOTH LIVELY ACTIVITIES AND QUIET READING

the new library

- Expanded Children's Wing with 5,730 square feet of space
- Self-contained wing centrally located on ground floor, adjacent to entry lobby for ease of visiting
- Dedicated programming/craft space within the wing specifically for children's activities
- Multiple reading nooks and play areas with toys and puzzles
- Secure outdoor program space connected to Children's Wing
- Stroller parking and a nursing room



PARTIAL VIEW OF CHILDREN'S WING

The daylit children's area offers a mix of various spaces for differing ages and uses, including a dedicated program room and secure exterior space accessed only from the Children's Wing.

the new library

- Balcony Bar overlooking the first floor and lobby for work and study
- Innovation Center with studios and workshops
- Bookstacks with quiet, comfortable reading spaces and tables for spreading out
- Outdoor porch and wall of windows
- Library of Things collection of tech equipment, craft tools, gaming systems, musical instruments, etc.

VIEW OF 2ND FLOOR OVERLOOKING LOBBY

The first and second floors are open to one another to allow for increased sight lines and an overall feeling of community. The second floor includes the fiction and non-fiction collections, reference area, multiple types of seating spaces, the teen room, and various dedicated spaces including the historic rooms, technology rooms, and quiet study rooms.

AN INVITING HANGOUT FOR BELMONT'S TEENS



“After school, we walk down from Chenery for the weekly 'Hot Chocolate Hang Outs' in the Teen Room. I guess we get **some** homework done!

“Sometimes I have an afternoon client meeting, and I feel really comfortable that my daughter has a fun place to hang out after school.



“We worked on our Egg Drop project for Physics in the Teen Room. We used the 3D printer to make some of the parts we designed and we got extra credit points.



the new library

- Expanded Teen Room with 1,590 square feet of space
- Dedicated, enclosed space where teens can be teens
- Multiple zones for hanging out or studying
- Easy access to the Innovation Center
- Charging stations everywhere and high-speed connectivity

VIEW OF YOUNG ADULT AREA

The teen room is on the second floor overlooking Concord Avenue. Acoustically separated but visually connected to the remainder of the second floor, this space is dedicated to library services for Belmont's young adults and provides a space to hang out and collaborate.





There are only two options for places to go at night in Belmont - a restaurant or the library. The library is really beautiful when it's all lit up in the evening.

I love to sit on the 2nd floor porch looking out over the Underwood Park and Pool and see people coming and going.

INDOOR + OUTDOOR READING AREAS



In the winter, when it's too cold to sit outside, the wall of windows gives me my sunlight 'fix' in the comfort of the warm library. It makes me happy.



the new library

- Large outdoor porch that can be used for reading or gathering
- The exterior porch is an additional option for library users who prefer to remain outdoors
- Plentiful natural light from the 'wall of windows'
- A bright, open feeling in what are traditionally cramped, shadowed bookstacks and dark reading rooms

VIEW OF OUTDOOR PORCH + READING AREA

The traditional library bookstacks, quiet reading, and work zones are redefined by the 'wall of windows' that fill and energize the library with natural light.

CREATIVITY, AND LIFE-LONG LEARNING**

“ My mom meets with her language discussion partner in a Study Room; then she stays to read a magazine in the World Languages collection.



“ Our volunteer committee reserves a Collaboration Room for our planning meetings. It's amazing how hard it is to find a room with a whiteboard outside of work and school.



the new library

- Small study rooms for 1-2 people and larger collaboration rooms for 3-5 people
- Several flexible meeting rooms for programs and meetings
- Studios and workshops for building, creating, digital media, etc.
- Claflin Room and dedicated storage for Belmont historical displays and archives
- Quiet study tables, desks, and lounges throughout the library

VIEW OF QUIET STUDY / COLLABORATION ROOMS

The eight small rooms on the second floor can be reserved by members of the community. They are ideal for 2-5 person collaborations, study sessions, and meetings.

OUTDOOR SPACES THAT EXPAND THE OPTIONS FOR READING AND PROGRAMMING

While our daughter takes a library nature class by Wellington Brook, we sit in Adirondack chairs and read. It's beautiful out there.



I don't have WIFI at home. Every morning at 7am I head to the Outdoor Library and do my computer stuff before work. The library's not even open yet!



It's great to have an outdoor meeting space in town. I enjoy the sunshine, and I'm glad that all of our group members can have fun participating.



the new library

- Secure outdoor program space connected to Children's Wing
- Outdoor classroom for programs and speakers
- Event terrace connected to the Belmont Community Room
- Chairs and tables for eating, reading, working, and chatting with friends
- Native plant landscaping and walking paths
- Preserved Woodland Gardens

A BUILDING THAT SUPPORTS BELMONT'S SUSTAINABILITY GOALS



“Over a decade ago, Belmont Town Meeting made a commitment to reduce our carbon emissions by 80% by 2050. The library's sustainability features can help us get there.

“It's important to me that the library is doing its share to address climate change. Every choice matters.



the new library

- A south facing solar photovoltaic (PV) array
- All-electric systems (no fossil fuels)
- A highly insulated building envelope
- Glazing/glass under 40% of the building envelope area
- Daylighting with window and skylight placement selected to maximize effective internal lighting
- Stormwater management systems
- A rain garden filtration system
- Native vegetation
- Car charging stations

ENERGY EFFICIENT BUILDING SYSTEMS

An all-electric VRF mechanical system contributes to a Zero Net Energy-ready building by eliminating fossil fuel use and reducing energy consumption through it's high efficiency operation



NATURAL DAYLIGHTING

Natural light is invited deep into the library interior to illuminate reading spaces and reduce electric lighting loads



SOUTH FACING SOLAR PANELS

Roof-mounted photovoltaic (PV) panels contribute directly to the library's energy needs and reduce the building's overall ecological footprint



NATIVE PLANT SPECIES

Native species are restored along the banks of Wellington Brook to maintain the longevity of the brook landscape and provide an inviting teaching tool



HIGH PERFORMANCE ENVELOPE

The library's walls, roof and windows are highly insulated to limit energy transfer and maximize the efficiency of heating and cooling systems



HEALTHY MATERIALS

Interior finishes and furniture use sustainable materials to ensure the long term health and wellbeing of the library occupants and library collection

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Vegetated swales and rain gardens capture and filter rainwater while runoff is reduced using permeable paving in place of conventional asphalt



ACTIVE LANDSCAPE


Outdoor walking paths and intimate reading spaces create an active landscape along Wellington Brook linking the library, Woodland Garden and Underwood Pool & Playground




GROUND FLOOR PLAN
